



Results Survey for Students Vocational school "Asen Zlatarov", Vidin, Bulgaria

The survey for students has been filled out by 100 students from the Asen Zlatarov VET school in Vidin, Bulgaria. The students are in the following grades: 8, 10, 11, 12 and for some it is unclear in which grade the student is. Throughout this report, the responses will be displayed in a quantitative as well as qualitative way.




Figure 1: Education process / school

The students were asked to indicate to what degree they agree with the six statements related to the educational process and school. Please see Figure 1: Education process / school for the quantitative picture.

Figure 1 shows that overall a large majority agrees or rather agrees with the statements. To be exact: 73, 81, 60, 64, 71 students agree or rather agree with the statements about the educational process and school from left to right respectively. This implies that 27, 19, 40, 36, 29 students rather disagree or disagree with these statements. These numbers indicate an overall good level of happiness when it comes to their educational process and school.




Figure 2: Open questions regarding the educational process and school

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The students were also asked to answer open questions about the educational process and school. Figure 2 displays how the students answered the open questions. To the first open question: 'Is there anything you would change in the educational process at your school?' most students answered they would not change anything. To be precise 75 students do not want to change anything, 24 would like to change something and 1 student did not answer the question.

The 24 students who would like to change something about the educational process commented the following:

• Grade 10:

- o more vacations;
- o better equipment;
- tailored lessons for classes;
- shorter classes and classes outside

• Grade 11:

- o classes could be more interesting and funnier;
- teachers' competences and attitudes;
- o more free thinking;
- o longer vacations;
- o rewire electronic system





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• Grade 12:

- everything;
- o no homework and tests;
- o more group work;
- o the attitude of some teachers towards the students;
- o freely express opinion

• Grade unknown:

- o nothing;
- o student's attitudes;
- o remove useless lessons

The second open question asked the students whether there is anything that disappoints them in their educational process. Again a large majority indicated that nothing disappoints them (see Figure 2). Out of 100 students, 72 indicated that they were not disappointed, 25 indicated that they are disappointed with the educational process and school and 3 students did not answer the question.

The 25 students who are disappointed, expressed that they are disappointed by the following

• Grade 8:

o Teachers do not always understand me

• **Grade10**:

- o several comments about the teachers' attitude and competences;
- o students want their opinion to matter;
- o some things are useless;
- o more classes about technology

• Grade 11:

- o teachers do not understand and do not listen the students;
- o teachers are not always fair with grades;
- teachers are nagging;
- o teachers tolerate idiots too much.

• Grade 12:

- o comments about the teachers,
- o they are not teaching just making sure that students pass the test

Grade unknown:

o The lack of motivation in everyone




Figure 3: What gives you the motivation to learn?




Figure 4: Do you find this motivator at your school?

The students were also asked what gives them motivation to learn and whether they find this motivation at their school. The results are displayed in Figure 3 and Figure 4 respectively.

Figure 3 illustrates the most common motivators among students from the Asen Zlatarov school. It seems like the three most important factors are: their future, nothing and the chance to get a scholarship. Out of 100 students 28 said something about their future, 18 responded that nothing gives them motivation to learn and 15 students indicated that the chance of receiving a scholarship is a driver.

Figure 4 demonstrates that the majority of students find the motivations, they mentioned above, to some extent at their current school. 31 students answered this question with yes, 32 students said to some extent. 20 students indicated that they do not find their motivations at school and 17 students did not answer the question.

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


Figure 5: Cooperation with teachers

The following questions measure the cooperation, relation with as well as the view on the teachers. Figure 5 displays to what degree students agree with the statements on the cooperation with teachers. The majority seems to agree or rather agree with the statements. From left to right 72, 62, 78, 61 and 72 students agree or rather agree with the statements. Thus, 28, 38, 22, 39 and 28 students rather disagree or disagree with the statements concerning cooperation with the teachers.




Figure 6: What kind of values do you appreciate in your teacher?

The students were also asked what kind of values they appreciate in their teachers. Figure 6 presents, which values were most commonly mentioned. Especially the following values were reoccurring throughout the answers of the students: friendly, open, knowledgeable and trustful. Approximately 71, 47, 46 and 44 students indicated that these values are important to them. The values attractive and strict were also quite important to the students. 28 and 25 students respectively indicated that they appreciate it if their teachers are attractive and strict.




Figure 7: Do you feel that teachers understand you?

The students were also asked whether they feel understood by their teachers. Figure 7 displays

whether students feel understood per grade. The blue and green colours represent those students who answered the question with yes. The red and pink colours represent the students who answered the question with no.

Overall, more students seem to feel understood by their teachers compared to students who indicated they do not feel understood by their teachers. In total 62 students answered this question with yes. These 62 students consist of 3 students from grade 8, 18 from grade 10, 28 from grade 11, 6 from grade 12 and 7 students did not indicate their grade.

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37 students indicated that they do not feel understood by their teachers. From these 37 students, 1 is from grade 8; 12 are from grade 10; 7 students from grade 11; 12 from grade 12 and 5 students did not indicate their grade. One student did not answer this question.




Figure 8: Do you feel satisfied with the educational process?

Most of the students seem to be satisfied with the educational process most of the time. Out of 100 participants half of them answered this question with 'Yes, often'. 34 students indicated that they are rarely satisfied with the educational process. 8 students indicated that they are always satisfied and also 8 students indicated that they are not satisfied with the educational process.




Figure 9: Students' opinions about lessons

The next questions measure what the students think of the lessons. Again it seems like the fast majority of students agree or rather agree with the statements. Please see Figure 9 for the complete overview. From left to right: 90, 74, 65, 68, 59, 74, 59, 86, 80, 60, 70, 75, 74 agree or rather agree with the statements. This also means that about 10, 26, 35, 32, 41, 26, 41, 14, 20, 40, 30, 25 and 26 students rather disagree or disagree with the statements. These numbers indicate that the students seem to be quite happy with the lessons. Furthermore, it seems that students like to work in groups as well as individually.

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The students were also asked what their perfect lesson would look like. Please see below an overview of the answers per grade:

• Grade 8:

- The teacher should be funny and strict
- o Revision
- Nothing

• Grade 10:

- Listen to music and play games
- Learning and doing new and interesting things
- Group work and activities
- Learning something interesting
- o Teacher presents and talks with the students
- O Discussing and thinking together about a subject
- Sitting with my friend who makes the lesson funny
- Watching a movie
- Qualified teacher who interacts with the students
- More entertainment, for example Kahoot!

• Grade 11:

- o Play games and learn at the same time
- Attractive and funny
- Interesting facts, funny remarks and real life situations
- o Educational games, e.g. Kahoot!
- Watch a presentation without writing
- Module
- Movie
- o There is no such thing
- With music

• Grade 12:

- Use technology and dialogue with the teacher
- Using different games to learn new things
- Short education documentary
- o Dialogue and discussion rather than a presentation
- Openly express our opinion and discuss what students already know about the topic
- o Music, friendly and good attitude of the teacher

• Grade Unknown:

- O Dialogue rather than a presentation from the teacher
- More use of technology
- o Play games
- Class outside of school
- Interesting





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


Figure 10: Is innovation needed

Figure 10 illustrates whether students think that education needs more innovations during the classes. The majority seems to be okay with the lessons. A majority of 60 students answered this question with 'No'. 37 students do think that innovation is needed and 3 students did not answer the question. Please see below what kind of innovation the 37 students suggested.

Comments:

- Innovate the system
- Make subjects more entertaining
- The ability to work together as a team, mimicking the work environment we will be in, in the future
- Buying more laptops
- More use of technology during class
- More funny activities
- Maybe teacher can become aware that teaching is more than standing in front of the class and tell the students what is written in the text books
- More use of games
- The whole educational system should be replaced
- More ucha.se in class
- More videos

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


Figure 11: Cooperation with actors

Lastly, the students were asked to rate their cooperation with different actors in and outside of school including teachers, administrative staff, parents and employees. Overall the students seem to be content with the cooperation with these groups. Especially the cooperation with parents seems to be good. Please see Figure 11 for the complete overview.

As stated above especially the cooperation with parents is good according to the students. 60 students rated the cooperation with parents with a 5. Whereas for the other groups from left to right, 24, 11 and 14 students rated the cooperation with these groups with a 5.

The students seem to be least happy with the cooperation with the administrative staff and the employers. 18 students gave the cooperation with the administration a 1 and 17 students rated the cooperation with employers with a 1.

Conclusion

Overall it seems that these students are quite content with their educational system, cooperation with teachers and other actors as well as the quality of the lessons. The difference between the happiness or content rated through statements and closed questions and on the other hand open questions seem to be relatively large. Most of the comments seem quite negative; this paints a more negative picture compared to the quantitative questions.
